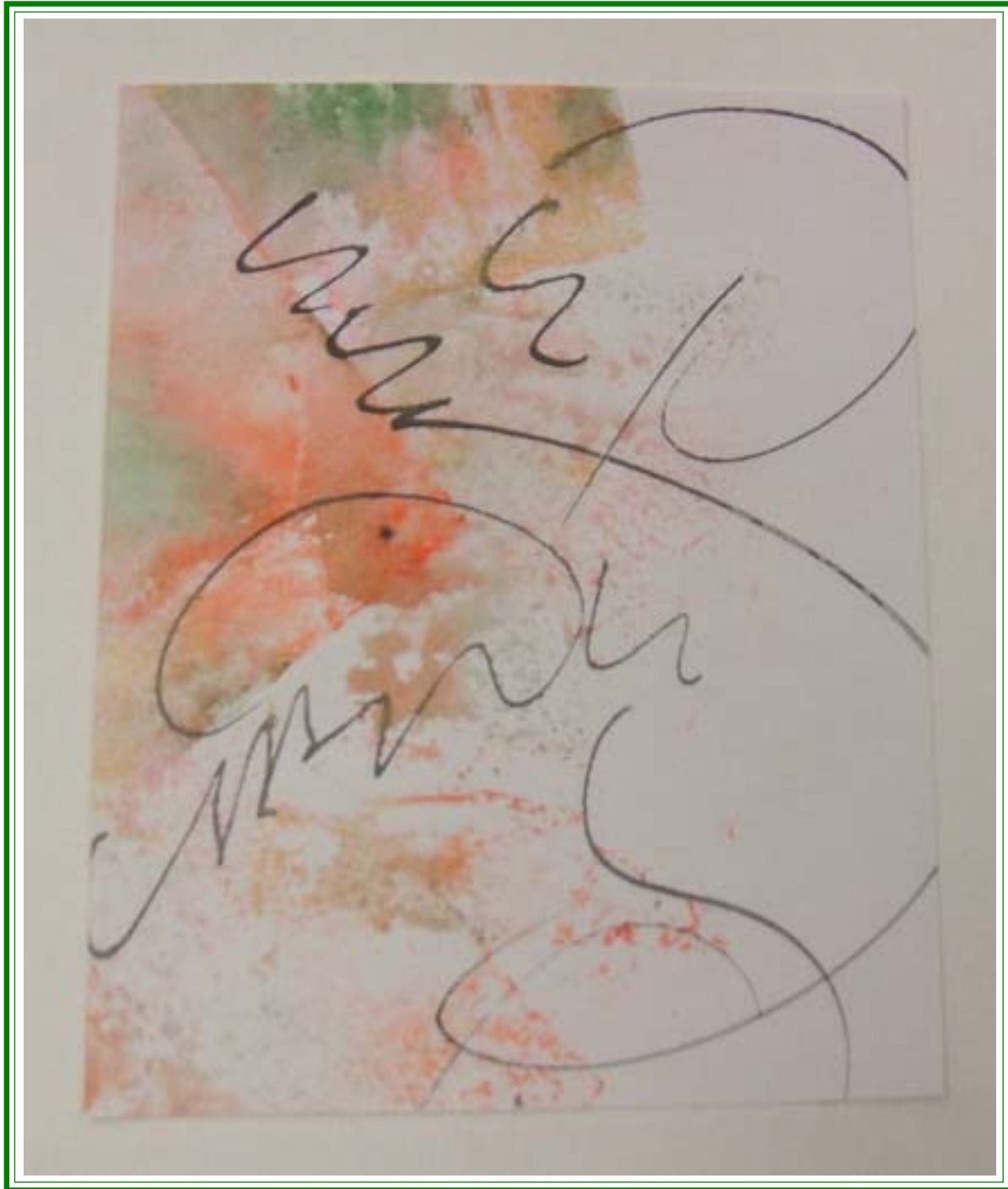

I recently took the “Write of Passage” class with Sharon Zeugin at Letters-California Style 2009.

Sharon said that she was “most interested in providing an opportunity for an inward shift, where the focus will be creating a more personally expressive, unique and (perhaps) deeply felt calligraphy.”

This was accomplished by looking at the lines in nature (this was easy as our classroom had glass on 2 sides and was in the trees), drawing many lines with different tools including some from nature. We spread letters, wrote illegibly, and made many lines and marks.

Sharon read the following which sums up the ideas of the class:

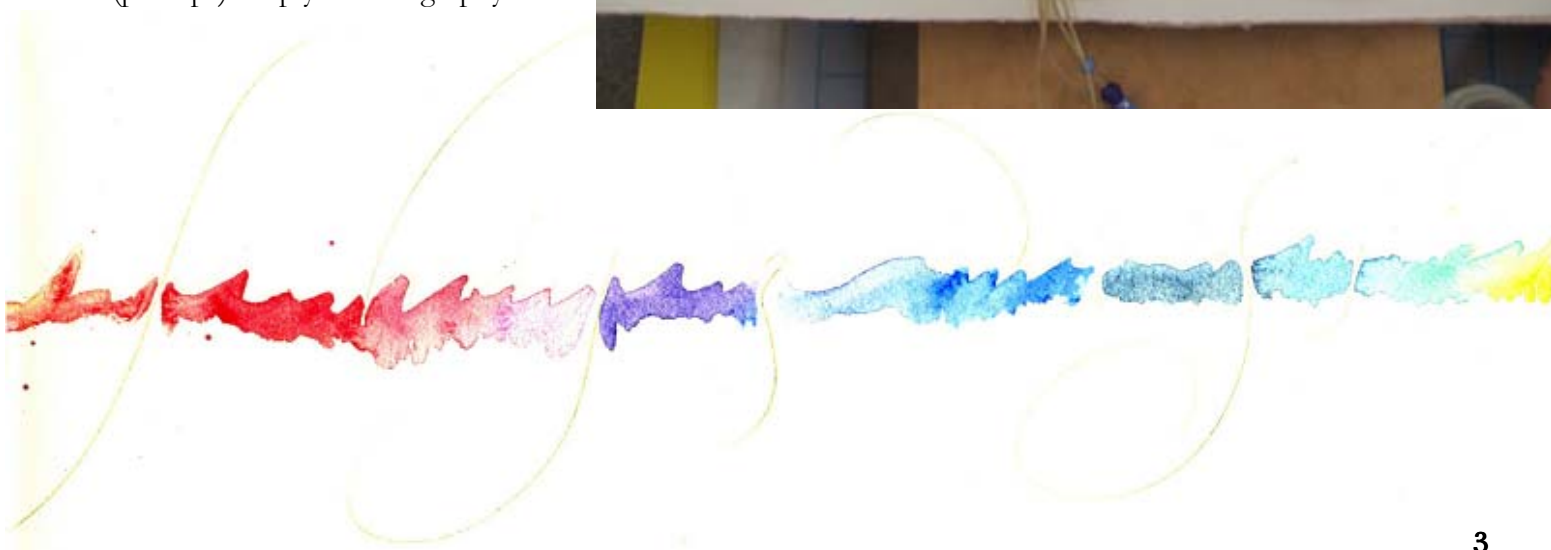
“The quality of line is what matters most - how deep, strong

You can't hide anything in a line. You are there whatever line you draw. And you will stay there, even when you go somewhere else. If your personality is interesting enough, the line will be interesting. To do this, you must be fearless.”

Petrita Alcon

Petrita M. Alcon, 66 passed away on Friday, January 30, 2009. She was a long time member of Escribiente, Albuquerque's Calligraphy guild. Her calligraphy work evolved from a hobby to a profession and won many blue ribbon awards for her works that were in shows such as the NM State Fair. She was loved by all, and will be greatly missed.

How I Met Petrita

Back in 1990, I moved to Albuquerque in time to experience the Balloon Fiesta. I spent most of October exploring Albuquerque and looking for a job. As a new resident of ABQ, I knew I had to join a calligraphy guild to meet other crazy calligraphers who were obsessed with pens, ink, and paper. While helping my friend at her store on Central, one of her artist friends told me that I probably could find out where the calligraphy guild met by going to Artisans. At the time, Artisans was on Candelaria in the North Valley. November was busy since I finally found work, and in December I made my way to the art store. I spoke to the guy who was working there and asked him if he knew about the calligraphy guild. He said that he did and that the president often came into the store. I wrote my name and phone number down on a piece of paper with a message on it, and in comes this lovely red head and the art store guy said, "That's her!" Petrita and I talked for some time and she invited me to an Escribiente Calligraphy Show at a library. She introduced me to all of the members and went on to invite me to a meeting. Dan Paulos was the speaker and presented a slide presentation on his papercutting techniques and other papercutting artists. One of the artists lived in my hometown and was a friend of mine. I felt like I had found my new group of friends among Escribiente and felt so welcomed. It was because of Petrita that I quickly became part of Albuquerque's art scene.

There are so many memories and good times to share – paste paper parties up at her cabin in the mountains, adventures at Ghost Ranch and shining our Goddess Light, walks along the river, tea and scones at the Alcon home, hours of teaching her the computer, calligraphy workshops, meetings, phone conversations, birthday cards, her 60th birthday bash, and the list goes on. I will miss her dearly. She was more than just a friend to me, she was family. I know she is shining her Goddess Light up there in heaven and teaching all the other angels how to do brush lettering and telling them to clean their pens. (Okay, it was me she told to clean my pens because they were a



mess). Jake, Kelly, Laura and the rest of the Madrid/Alcon clan were so fortunate to have her in their family. We, her friends, were fortunate to have her in our lives as well. She was a shining star to all of us.

LETTERS-CALIFORNIA STYLE 2009 - part 2...

“Mastering Manipulation and Other Dances” with Carrie Imai was the name of my class. We reviewed Neuland style and Carrie’s own variation of that letterform. She also briefly touched upon Italic, addressing components of width, weight, pen angle and slant. We used automatic pens, various types of wood nibs, chop sticks, stim-u-dents and sponges (to name a few) while practicing. She showed us how to hold the ‘pen’ in order to manipulate a freestyle letterform using variations of Neuland and Italic. One of the first things she said was to tighten up space between the lines by eliminating white space within the prose. Relaxing the hand while holding

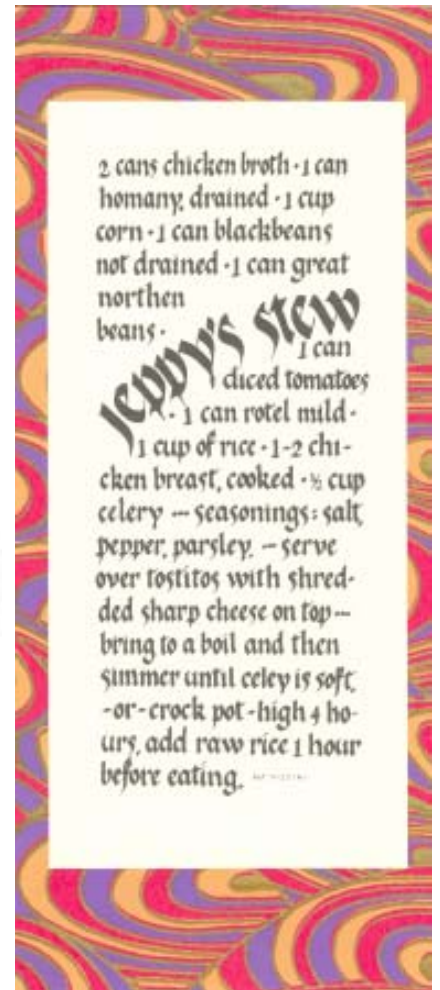

the pen was another point that she emphasized to create beautiful hairline serifs. Carrie called her style a ‘happy marriage’ between the tool, media and the surface.

This was a great class! Carrie was very positive and humorous throughout. She is a good teacher and I would definitely recommend her classes.

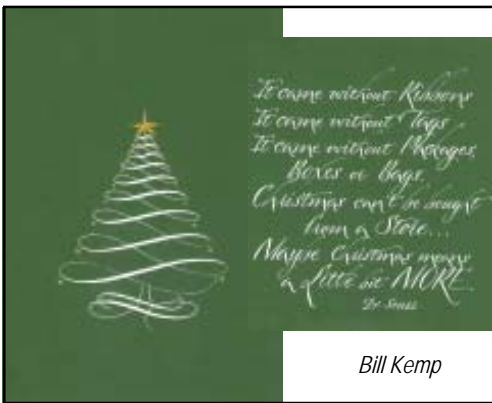

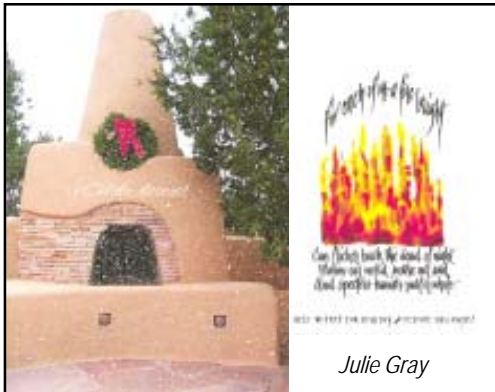

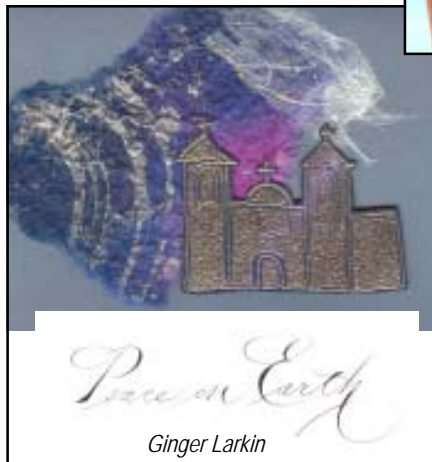

Member Profile

Bill Kemp

Where are you from?

I was born in Canton, Ohio. Some of you have heard of the Football Hall of Fame; well, that is my hometown.

What part of town do you live in?

I live in the Northeast Heights of Albuquerque.

Education/Art background?

Well, my education is in engineering, electronics to be more precise. But when I was younger, I wanted to be an architect. I took many years of drafting, which I thought would lead me to that career, but it did not.

Family?

My family consists of my wife, Linda of 38 years, and our daughter Jennifer. My Dad and brother still live in Ohio, while my two sisters are from the east coast (Virginia) to the west coast (California).

What do you do for a living to support your calligraphic habit?

Believe that is a loaded question. I retired from Federal Civil Service after 35 years in 2006, during which I wore many hats. My primary job was an electrical technician, but also included Radiation Safety Officer, Lab Manager and property manager of three buildings. After I retired, I was happy doing my calligraphy work for about three months. I

received a call asking me to come back and work for the Air Force, as a contractor. So now I am a consultant or Radiation Test Engineer which operates, maintains, conducts experiments in various radiation environments and oversees the tests that are conducted at those facilities at the Air Force Research Laboratory. Now that was probably far more information than you truly wanted to know about me.

How long have you been doing calligraphy?

I have been practicing the art of calligraphy since 1973, you can do the math.



What/who got you started?

When I was very young I had an interest in lettering, but had no idea at the time what calligraphy was or what it consisted of. My oldest sister was talented in drawing and that fascinated me very much. Then when I was in the military (stationed here in Albuquerque), and not knowing what I really wished to do, I saw a calligraphy class



offered at the Continuing Education Department at UNM. My very first instructor was Terry Kocon and the rest is history.

Who most influenced you in your calligraphic travels?

There were several that I would have to list. The first was Dick Jackson for pointed pen, Fred Yost and Kathy Chilton for broad nib, Michael Sull for Spencerian Script, and my mentor for Engrosser's Script is Mr. Bill Lilly.

What are your favorites, and which one would you most like to pursue?

My favorite is Engrosser's Script, or

more commonly known as Copperplate. The one I would love to pursue is Ornamental Script that Mr. Lilly has mastered and is currently teaching me.

Are you interested in any other art medium?

The only thing that I would be interested in would be making different kinds of books, if that is an art medium.

What does *Escribiente* mean to you?

Learning and sharing the art of calligraphy. Having a circle of friends who also like the same interest as you: the calligraphic arts. *Escribiente* has many meanings to me, but the most and best thing about this Guild is its members. The people are giving, understanding, caring and very much willing to share their skills with others. They are willing to help you in many aspects. I can not find the words that would give justice to them. I thank *Escribiente* for teaching me and

allowing me to grow to the person and artist I am today.

What do you plan to do or see as a goal for your calligraphic talents?

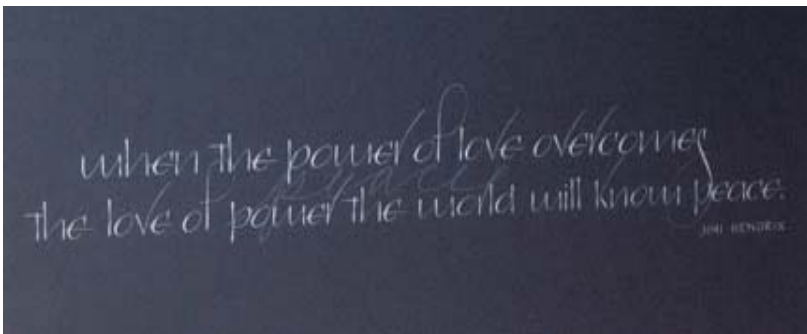
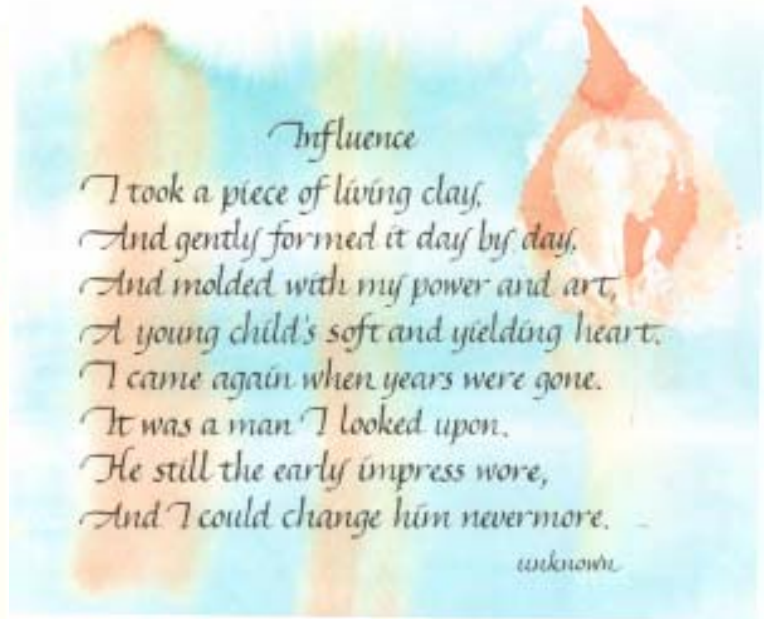
I would like to teach more. Presently I teach at a store in Berkeley, California. I have been teaching there for the past five years, going out three to four times a year. The scripts I

teach range from

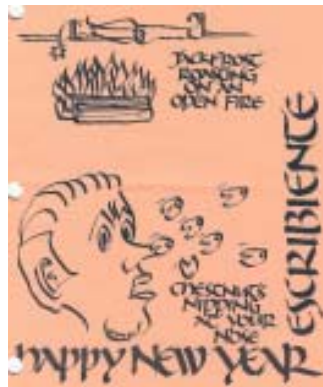
Italic to Spencerian Script, but my main classes are focused on the pointed pen. I may teach at the next IAMPETH (*International Association of Master Penmen, Engrossers and Teachers of Handwriting*) convention in 2009 and have been toying with the idea of submitting my application to teach at Ghost Ranch in 2010. Then I have my own calligraphy business, which I really enjoy doing. To see the people's reaction when they are surprised by your artwork is the most gratification than one would ever think to receive. So that is my story and I am sticking with it.



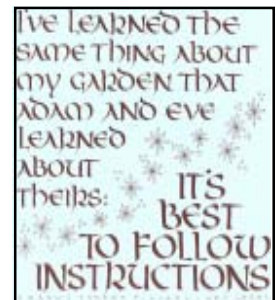

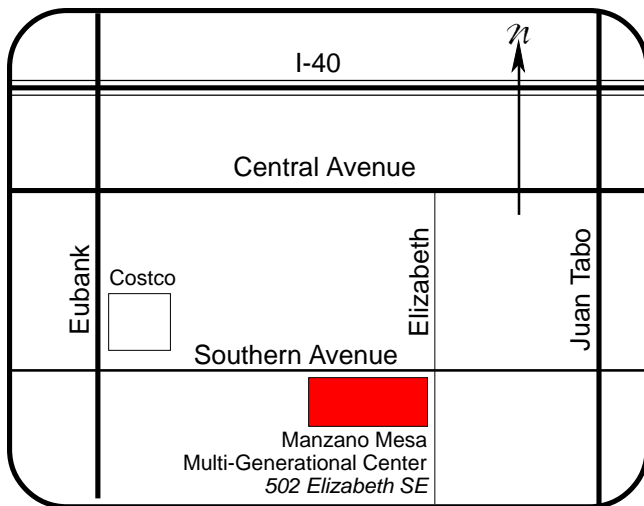
